

Since 2009, the *Nestlé Cocoa Plan* has positively impacted cocoa-farming families across our three pillars: Better Farming, Better Lives, Better Cocoa. By the end of 2025, we aim to achieve 100% cocoa sourced through the *Nestlé Cocoa Plan*.¹

In 2024, we made significant progress toward our goal, sourcing 88.9% of our cocoa through the program. We also engaged with more than 8 000 new farmers – bringing the total to 187454 – equipping them with training and resources to help improve yields and livelihoods.

Every year, we report on our progress alongside our measurement and evaluation partners: the <u>Rainforest Alliance</u>, <u>International</u> <u>Cocoa Initiative</u> and KIT Institute.

INCOME ACCELERATOR PROGRAM

The Nestlé income accelerator program engages more than 30000 cocoa-farming families in Côte d'Ivoire and Ghana, aiming to reach, where relevant, an estimated 160000 families.



ORIGINS OF COCOA SOURCED THROUGH THE NESTLÉ COCOA PLAN

In 2024, the Nestlé Cocoa Plan engaged with more than 187000 cocoa-farming families across 11 origin countries, sourcing a total of almost 298000 tonnes of cocoa.





A COLLABORATIVE APPROACH

The *Nestlé Cocoa Plan* is building on more than 15 years of experience in the field with the support of our partners.

We work hand-in-hand with expert organizations that help us measure and evaluate the impact of our actions across key areas: forest protection and restoration, improved livelihoods for cocoa-farming families, community development, and access to education.

These partnerships demonstrate the power of collaboration in both delivery and assessment. Supported by the *Nestlé Cocoa Plan* team, our work also relies on close engagement with cocoa-farming families, cooperatives, local communities, suppliers, and public institutions.

In Côte d'Ivoire, for example, we work with the Ministère des Eaux et Forêts (MINEF) and the Société de développement des Forêts (SODEFOR) to support key forest protection and restoration efforts around the Cavally Forest Reserve.

2024 PERFORMANCE

Our Key Performance Indicators are presented across the *Nestlé Cocoa Plan's* three strategy pillars: Better Farming, Better Lives and Better Cocoa.

The data presented in this report covers the calendar year January 1 – December 31, 2024, and were collected by the Rainforest Alliance and the International Cocoa Initiative. This is the second consecutive year we report on five countries of origin – Brazil, Côte d'Ivoire, Ecuador, Ghana and Mexico.
